What is Compassion Sabbath?

- Compassion Sabbath is an interfaith initiative to provide clergy and religious educators tools for addressing the spiritual needs of the seriously ill, the dying and their families.
- The Compassion Sabbath initiative was developed by the Center for Practical Bioethics of Kansas City in 1999. Kansas City's Compassion Sabbath was a huge success and reached over 80,000 faith community leaders and clergy members.
- Compassion Sabbath is now observed in approximately 24 states. This is the first time Compassion Sabbath will be observed in the Metropolitan Detroit area.

Why should my congregation participate in this effort?

- Everyone dies, but not everyone dies well.
- High-tech health care alone fails to meet the needs of dying people, who need spiritual support as they approach the end of their lives. Compassion Sabbath conversations will help improve end-of-life care and bridge the gap between medical and spiritual dimensions of dying.
- Dying people in your congregation and their loved ones look to you for spiritual support. You and your faith community can significantly help meet their needs and improve the quality of care congregants and their loved ones receive at the end of life.
- Compassion Sabbath will provide you tools and resources to better minister to seriously ill and dying people, and thus make an important difference in improving their care.

What are some of the events of Compassion Sabbath 2007?

Faith communities are invited to set aside one service or event on this date to focus on prayers, scripture, reading, speakers, sermons and/or educational efforts on end-of-life issues. It is the goal of St. John Health to have as many faith communities as possible to deliver this message.*

SPEAKERS

Rev. Tarris Rosell, DMin, PhD, has been a Program Associate at the Center for Practical Bioethics since April 2004. His work emphasizes disparities in health and healthcare, while addressing other biomedical ethics issues as well. Dr. Rosell is also an ordained American Baptist minister and Associate Professor teaching ethics and ministry praxis at Central Baptist Theological Seminary in Kansas City, Kansas.

Dr. Lewandowski has been caring for dying children for over seventeen years and has acted as an inpatient pediatric medical director for Hospice of Michigan since 1991 and pediatric medical director for the Hospices of Henry Ford since 2000 and now currently at St. John Hospice. She was the first and only pediatrician board certified in palliative medicine in the Midwest in 1996. She was appointed by Governor John Engler to represent Michigan physicians on the Michigan Commission on End of Life Care.

Dr. Richard Payne is an internationally known expert in the areas of pain relief, care for those near death, oncology and neurology, and is the Ester Colliflower Director of the Duke Institute on Care at the End of Life at the Duke Divinity School. Prior to his appointment at Duke, Dr. Payne led the Pain and Palliative Care Service at Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center in New York City since 1998. From 2003-2004, Dr. Payne was President of the American Pain Society. He is certified in hospice and palliative medicine by The American Board of Hospice and Palliative Medicine, in neurology & pain medicine and by The American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology.

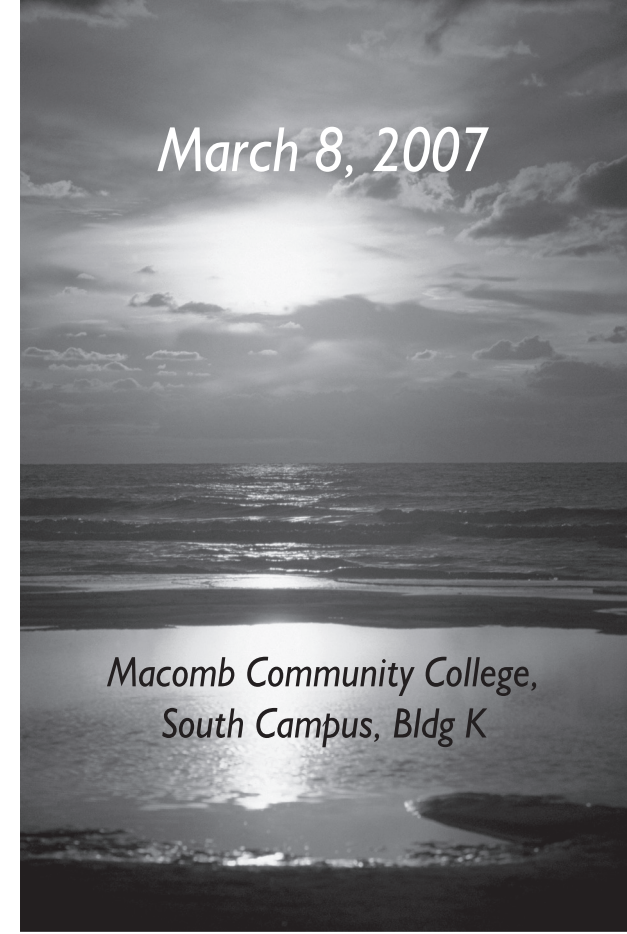
Mary Hicks, APRN-BC, is a Nurse Practitioner, Palliative Care Service Coordinator, at St. John Hospital and Medical Center with over 20 years experience caring for critically ill patients. She has worked closely with The Center to Advance Palliative Care to facilitate designation of SJH&MC to be recognized as ‘Palliative Care Star’ nationally.

Pastor Corey L. Kennard is the Founder and Pastor of Kingdom Equipping Ministries. He began his work in ministry in 1994 and has served in various pastoral and other leadership positions. He founded and development the Kijana (Youth) Institute, a multicultural rites of passage program. He also serves as a staff chaplain of St. John Detroit Riverview Hospital.

Elder Risarg Huff received a Bachelors degree from the University of Michigan and a Masters degree in Social Work from Wayne State University and has over twenty-five years of service in our community. He was ordained in the ministry in 1991. In 1997 he started his own ministry as the pastor of the Shekinah Tabernacle Gospel Church.

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
